SPECIAL JOINT MEETING WITH MISD BOARD

SPECIAL BUSINESS

School District and City Funding Constraints

Mercer Island School District's COO, Dean Mack, and the City of Mercer Island's Finance Director, Chip Corder, will highlight constraints that impact each agency's ability to fund its respective missions. Following their presentation, a short description of joint efforts supporting students and community will be shared. Such efforts include the following: Youth and Family Services' school counselors; coordination and use of elementary and middle school fields; public park subsidies; Mary Wayte Pool operating subsidy along with major investments in infrastructure improvements.

Transportation Issues and Impacts

Mercer Island School District Transportation Director, Dave Bynum, will discuss the following topics: the high school and middle school new drop-off areas, and flow through the school driveways; the number of busses needed to transport students to four (4) elementary schools, and the length of transition times; and, the number of students crossing streets around the North Mercer Complex. Consultant Brandy Fox will share information about traffic impacts, and coordination with City staff, resulting from construction and use of the district's three (3) major bond projects.

The City of Mercer Island staff will share information about traffic impacts in the major interchanges and arterials resulting from new school boundaries and changes to the ingress and egress of cars and busses on the district's properties.


Both City staff and District staff will address the following topics: safe routes to school; and stop-arm cameras on school busses, with City staff sharing information on the number of tickets issued and incidents under review.






General Fund 2017 Resources




General Fund 2017 Expenditures

2017-2018 Projected Deficits

- General Fund: \$1.13M in 2018 (3.8% of budget)
 - Primary drivers
 - Expenditures are growing faster than revenues
 - Property tax 1% limitation (which is less than inflation)
 - Development activity projected to slow down in 2017-2018
- YFS Fund: \$393K in 2018 (13.9% of budget)
 - Primary drivers
 - General Fund annual support reduced in 2010-2014
 - Thrift Shop sales leveled off in 2013-2014
 - MISD annual support reduced to \$60K in 2010
 - 4th elementary school counselor

Budget Balancing Options

Option 1: Expenditure Cuts

Option 2: Levy Lid Lift*

City's Tax Revenue Tools

Utility tax

- 5.3% tax rate on City's water, sewer, and storm water utilities (no rate limit)
- 1% tax rate increase = \$165K per year
- Downside: This is a regressive tax
- Property tax (levy lid lift)
 - City's 2016 levy rate = \$1.16502
 - City's maximum statutory levy rate = \$3.40061

Recommended Path Forward

- Initiate two separate public engagement processes in Feb-Apr 2017 on:
 - City's operating funding needs (General Fund and YFS Fund deficits)
 - 2. City's capital funding challenges, utilizing a community stakeholder group
 - Project candidates include pedestrian/bicycle facility and park projects (e.g. synthetic turf upgrades to ballfields)
 - Example scenario: \$9.0M capital projects = \$100 per year for 9 years on a \$1.0M home
